The minor in History consists of a total of six courses (or 24 credit hours), including:
$\square$ A minimum of one course from each of two chronological periods: pre-1800 and post-1800.
$\square$ A minimum of one course from at least two of the following geographical areas: Africa, Asia and the Pacific, Europe, Latin America, the Middle East, the United States.
$\square$ A minimum of four courses (or 16 credit hours) taken from department faculty.

- No more than two courses taken outside the department can be counted toward the minor. This includes study abroad courses, cross-listed courses taught by faculty not formally associated with the department of history, and no more than four elective credit hours (the equivalent of one course) for AP and IB exams.


## Advanced Placement

For scores of five on the Advanced Placement American history, European history, or world history exams, four credits (the equivalent of one course) will be granted. This may count as one the six courses required for the minor, but it may not be used to satisfy the geographical or chronological distribution requirements for the minor. No credit is given for scores lower than five.

## INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE

For scores of six or better in International Baccalaureate higher-level exams, four credits (the equivalent of one course) will be granted. This may count as one the six courses required for the minor, but it may not be used to satisfy the geographical or chronological distribution requirements for the minor. No credit is granted for standard-level exams or for higher-level scores lower than six.
