The Seward Family Digital Archive, University of Rochester Sep 2017 – Present The William Henry Seward Papers is the largest and most frequently cited manuscript collection in University of Rochester's Rare Books, Special Collections, and Preservation Department. The Seward project digitizes, transcribes, and annotates letters from the Seward Family, and makes them available on a public website. This digital humanities project has made the letters, which describe daily life in the nineteenth century over the course of decades, searchable by keyword, annotated the people mentioned within them and created a database with biographical information, all available to students, researchers, and the general public. The Seward Family Archive also involves the unique aspect of being a multi-generational digital humanities project, recruiting and training retiree citizen volunteers, whose expertise deciphering challenging handwriting is paired with students' knowledge of the technology and time period. In this position, I have been directly involved with the transcription of nineteenth-century handwriting, annotation, editing, and recruiting, training, and working with project volunteers.

Director of Grants Brockport Research Institute May 2016-present

In this role with a NYS-certified Women's Business Enterprise, I develop and write grant proposals for a variety of higher education and non-profit clients, building evidence-based arguments to support their applications for funding. These grants primarily provide funds for scholarships and better educational programs, including numerous initiatives for the advancement of women in STEM fields. I have written and reviewed grants for agencies including NEH, NSF, NYSED, DASNY, and private and corporate foundations, securing millions of dollars in state and federal funding for clients. I cultivate and develop new clients and projects, collaborating with faculty and administrators at institutions nationwide to create highly competitive proposals, and provide support for a network of associates and their client projects. I also train and mentor new grant writing professionals, primarily academic women, who often pursue grant writing to utilize their expertise, provide income, and stay connected with their fields while taking leave from full-time work to pursue educational advancement or care for children or family members. This model has been a primary focus, and asset, since the founding of the company in 2013.
