Course Description:

Introduction to the various types of theatres and Theatre Technicians.

Practical introduction to the theories and applications of construction techniques for the scenic environment; visual language, principals, safety and tools used in the creation of scenery and properties. Practical <u>introduction</u> to the principals, applications, equipment and safety of Lighting and Sound technologies for the Theatre.

Course Objectives:

- 1. To introduce students to Theatre Technology and the backstage environment.
- 2. To develop the necessary skills to safely operate a variety of woodworking tools.
- 3 To develop a basic understanding of materials and techniques used in scenic construction
- 4. To collaborate in the technical requirements of a theatre production.
- 5. To build the foundation for further exploration in Theatre Technology and the Arts.

Project:

Students will be assigned a project based on experience, interest and instructor approval, which may be an element of one of the Theatre productions presented during the semester.

Lab Requirement: All Theatre Labs are "Hands-On" and Physically Active

This requirement should not be taken lightly. 5-6 hours /week manadatory. Only 3 absences will be forgiven. Students are responsible for logging their hours in the Lab Book before / after each lab session.

Each student is expected to work 5-6 hours per week. Lab grade will be based on the following criteria:

Attendance & Attitude 25%: <u>Attending lab as scheduled, not arriving late, not leaving early</u>. Making arrangements for alternative times prior to scheduled hours. Respect for others, tools and theatre.

Task Completion 25%: Positive, enthusiastic, supportive behavior goes a very long way!

Initiative 25%: Helpful, volunteering, not sitting around watching others work. Thinking ahead. Proactive.

Skill Application 25%: Safety First. Safety glasses and hearing protection is available, use them! Applying what you have learned. Maintain a clean, safe working environment. Clean up work area.

Lab Grade Rubric (50% of Final Grade):

- 20% = Weekly Lab
- 50% = During the weeks of Load-In and Tech Rehearsals (25% each production)
- 30% = Strike (15% each production)

Performances:

Students are required to attend a performance for each production, typically 2. Write a brief reflection on the Technical Aspects of the production. Typed, double-spaced, Times 12 font. Please no more than 2 pages. This is a critique on how successful the technology (**lighting**, **sound**, **video**, **scenery**, props, costumes) was to supporting / enhancing the performance...or not. College level work will be expected.

Strike: The dismantling and/or storage of scenery, lighting, sound, props & costumes **Attendance is mandatory:** 03/09-10 and 05/04-05. Precise times and schedule will be forthcoming.
