# **COURSE #: ENG 174 TITLE: Acting Techniques**

Course Description: This course serves as an introduction to, and exploration of the acting process for the stage, developing the fundamental skills students need to approach a text from a performer's standpoint and to create character. The course takes as its basic premise that the actor's instrument is the self – with all of the physical, psychological, intellectual, social, moral and spiritual implications of that term. Students will be encouraged in both the expression and the expansion of the self and of the imagination. The class will also help the student develop an overall appreciation for the role of the theatre in today's society.

## **Course Aims & Objectives:**

Begin the process of developing a strong sense of mental concentration and focus.

Acquire a heightened awareness of the actor's physical and emotional instrument.

Learn how to interpret a script from the actor's point of view including beats, objectives, tactics and obstacles and to be able to articulate this verbally and in writing.

To recognize and strive for emotional truth in one's work.

Experience how to work collaboratively with scene partners in a disciplined fashion and respond to peer work in an insightful, constructive and generous manner.

View theatre productions and relate what you see to your class experience.

**Scene and Monologue Work:** This is an acting class. You will be required to memorize texts and rehearse them outside of class. You will be assigned one scene and one monologue to be rehearsed and performed in class. You may need to acquire props and costume pieces for your scene work.

Class Participation: Please come to class prepared to participate fully with your entire heart, mind and body. More than ONE ABSENCE during the semester will significantly impact your grade in this area. In case of documented illness every attempt will be made to help you make up the missed material.

NO CELL PHONE USE IN CLASS EXCEPT FOR ACCESS TO MATERIALS PERTINENT TO THE CLASS.

**Physicality requirements:** The nature of this course is such that physical contact will sometimes be required between participants in order to clarify an exercise or perform a scene. Every effort will be made to respect the individual in this process. If you are uncomfortable with this aspect of the course or if you have any physical injuries or disabilities, which might interfere with the physical nature of the course, please discuss this with your instructor at the beginning of the course or as concerns arise.

### **Required Texts & Readings:**

The instructor will provide readings electronically or in hard copy throughout the semester. You will need to purchase two scripts for your scene and monologue work.

**Recommended Attire**: Please come to class in comfortable, unrevealing clothing that will allow for a full range of movement. Heavy boots/street shoes are not allowed in Todd 107. Please wear soft soled shoes or be prepared to work in socks. When performing your scene and monologue these restrictions can be relaxed to allow for clothing appropriate to the character.

# Attendance Policy: More than ONE ABSENCE will significantly impact your grade. Three or more absences will result in a failing grade.

When working in pairs on a scene an A/F policy will be applied to a missed final performance. If a partner does not show up for an assigned performance, the partner that does attend will get an automatic A – the partner that is absent will receive an F and there will be no opportunity for another performance date. If both partners miss the performance date, they will both receive an F.

The instructor must be notified well in advance of any absence for religious observances.
