MANUSCRIPTS

Disobedient Reading: An Experiment in Seeing Black.

(University of California Press, in production Summer 2026; forthcoming Spring 2027)

This manuscript makes use of the black queer vernacular performance of “reading”—an interpretation/critique of embodied performance which is centered in one’s love and/or proximity to a black object—as a new way to theorize and analyze blackness. This project offers a hermeneutic of disobedience, as it refuses to accept that dominant modes of interpreting black lives and black rhetoric, opting for a pivot toward what some may refer to “nonsensical” readings. In *Disobedient Reading*, the hermeneutic of disobedience is executed in the intentional explorations of shared material objects within antebellum and contemporary contexts, producing a.) historical readings of Black queer objects as invitations toward cross-historical queer kinships toward freedom, b.) interrogation of the “productive function” of homophobic rhetoric in the black church c.) advancing the significant interventions of co-constitutive “femme” gendering performances between black queer men and straight women in popular culture, and d.) and the queerness of anti-black police and state violence. The critical practice I employ to read texts (film, literature, dead bodies) and spaces (plantations, churches, and death sites) is called disobedience, as it connotes an intentional move away from common, or canonical understandings toward new critical imaginaries. This book displays a method of engagement with Black things, which experiments with what happens when the *queer* and the *black* cannot be easily disaggregated.

Sexual Discretion: Black Masculinity and the Politics of Passing.

This manuscript combines media studies, literary analysis, and ethnography. It explores the relationship between black masculinity and queer sexuality, unveiling a “politics of sexual discretion.” Sexual Discretion has historically figured in black cultural production in contact with specific regulatory regimes that challenge racial/gender/sexual citizenship. This book challenges the construction of the closet as a universal paradigm

and illustrates how spatial/historical/cultural politics prompts queers of color to do queer differently.

This collection is also about what I have previously discussed as Chicago “architexture”—a notion which names the relationship between space and affect, as essential to understanding how Black queer folks experience youth and new communities.
