Ralph Locke, Musicology, Eastman School of Music, won the ASCAP-Deems Taylor Award for his article "Cutthroats and Casbah Dancers, Muezzins and Timeless Sands: Musical Images of the Middle East," published in the journal *Nineteenth-Century Music* (summer 1998). A somewhat shorter version of the article also appears in the book *The Exotic in Western Music*, ed. Jonathan Bellman (Northern University Press). This is the third time that Locke has received the award. The article, especially in its longer version, focuses on the representation of genre and sexuality (including portrayals of "dangerous women" and "passive/effeminate Men") in a number of musical works (especially operas) and how these are inflected (or even made possible) by the chosen exotic setting.
