Week Four (Sept. 28): Read assigned excerpts from Siegelbaum, et al, *Stalinism as a Way of Life*. First short paper due (on Gladkov and Kataev).

Week Five (Oct. 5): Read assigned excerpts from Von Geldern and Stites, *Mass Culture* in Soviet Russia.

Week Six (Oct. 12): Read Tucker, *Stalinism: Essays in Historical Interpretation*. Second short paper due (on Siegelbaum and Von Geldern).

Week Seven (Oct. 19): Read Fitzpatrick, Stalinism: New Directions.

Week Eight (Oct. 26): Third short paper due (on Tucker and Fitzpatrick). Research paper topic decisions.

Week Nine (Nov. 2): Bibliographies for research papers due.

Week Ten (Nov. 9): Show research notes.

Week Eleven (Nov. 16): Show research notes.

Week Twelve (Nov. 23): Show research notes, thesis, outline.

Week Thirteen (Nov. 30): Show approximately 8-10 pages of final paper.

Week Fourteen (Dec. 7): First draft of paper due.

During some of the classes between Nov. 2 and Dec. 7 we will be watching and discussing documentaries and Soviet films of the Stalin era.

Grading: Final research paper, 60 % of final grade; short papers (5-7 pages), 8 % each; class participation, 16 %.

Notes on final research paper: This paper will be from 20-25 pages long and include research based on primary sources. Students will choose topics under my supervision. I expect this paper to be of high quality, showing extensive research (given the time available to us) and careful attention to organization, argument, and writing style. Slapdash will result in a very poor grade.
