MEET THE ARTISTS

JeeHae Ahn began her piano studies at age three. She attended Yewon Art School and Seoul Arts High School in her native Korea and was a top prizewinner in numerous competitions, including the Junior Chopin Competition and the Busan Music Festival Competition. In 2008, she won the Boston Symphony Orchestra Concerto Competition and appeared as a featured soloist at Symphony Hall the following spring. She was featured in National Public Radio's program From the Top and was awarded the Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist Award. JeeHae graduated from Walnut Hill School for the Arts, where she received the Arnold C. Taylor Award. Subsequently, she was a full-scholarship student at the New England Conservatory of Music, where she studied with Wha Kyung Byun, Russell Sherman, and Meng-Chieh Liu. This past fall, she began her doctoral studies at the Eastman School of Music under Professor Rebecca Penneys. Most recently, she won the Eastman Piano Department's concerto competition and played Tchaikovsky's Piano Concerto No. 1 with the Eastman Philharmonia and Eastman School Symphony Orchestra (February, 2017).

Jenny Chen is the youngest Doctor of Musical Arts candidate and teaching assistant at the Eastman School of Music, where she studies with Professor Douglas Humpherys. She was the winner of the Henk de By Prize in the 9th International Franz Liszt Competition in the Netherlands in 2011. Born in Taipei, Taiwan, Chen started studying piano at the age of six. She was accepted by the Curtis Institute of Music at age ten, studying under Eleanor Sokoloff and Gary Graffman. She graduated with top honors and subsequently completed a master's degree at the Yale School of Music, where she studied with Robert Blocker and Melvin Chen. During her early years of study she won numerous first prizes. She also received Second Prize at the 2016 MTNA/Steinway Young Artists Competition, and silver medals at the Fifth New York International Piano Competition and the Twelfth Eastman Young Artists International Piano Competition. Chen's concerto performances include engagements with the Philadelphia Orchestra, Taipei Symphony Orchestra, Rochester Philharmonic, Harrisburg Symphony Orchestra, and the National Repertory and Downtown Symphony Orchestras of New York City.

Born in China, **Yang Li** entered the Middle School affiliated with the Shanghai Conservatory of Music at age twelve, studying with Professors Xiaosheng Zhao and Dapeng Chen. He continued his studies in the United States for his Bachelor of Music degree at the Eastman School of Music. Yang was awarded the First Prize at the Second Palatino Shanghai International Young Artist Piano Competition (2009) and the Gold Award and Chinese Special Composition Award at the Heitzmann China National Piano Competition (2005). Performances have included recitals at the National Music Teacher Conference and the "Finger Tip of China" concert at Communication University. In addition, he served as a guest performer and teacher in "summer care classes," a public service program organized by Shanghai municipal government every summer. Yang is currently pursuing his Master of Music degree at the Eastman, studying under Professor Douglas Humpherys.

Lorenzo Medel was born in Manila, the Philippines, in 1995 and began his piano studies at the age of ten under Mauricia Borromeo at the University of the Philippines. In the seven years that Lorenzo was with Professor Borromeo (2006-2013), he won top prizes in the Philippines' premier national piano competitions, including the National Music Competitions for Young Artists, the Piano Teachers' Guild of the Philippines Piano Competition, and the Steinway Piano Competition. By age sixteen, he had performed in twelve public concerts, including solo recitals and three concerto performances with the Manila Symphony Orchestra. Lorenzo is currently pursuing his Bachelor of Music at Eastman School of Music under Professor Natalya Antonova.

Songyuan Tang, born in Shenyang, China, started playing piano at the age of five, and performed his debut recital with Shenyang Symphony orchestra at the age of fourteen. He has won numerous national competitions in China, including second prize at the Xinghai National Piano Competition, and third prize at the Gulangyu National Piano Competition. In 2005, he won first prize and "Audience Favorite" at the Eastman International Piano Competition. He received the Yamaha Asia Music Scholarship in 2006. In 2015, he won first prize in the Marian Garcia International Piano Competition. He has played in masterclasses for renowned musicians such as Martin Canin, Alexander Schimpf, Thomas Schumacher, Victor Rosenbaum, Nelita True, Lang Lang, and Alexander Kobrin. Song-yuan is currently pursuing his Master of Music degree under Professor Douglas Humpherys at the Eastman School of Music.

Mi Zhou began piano studies at the age of seven at the Attached Middle School of the Shenyang Conservatory of Music. He has performed at the Liaoning Province Theater and SYCM concert hall. Mi Zhou has studied under Chenxin Xu, Younghi Moon, and Enrico Elisi. He is currently pursuing a Bachelor of Music degree with a merit scholarship at the Eastman School of Music under Professor Ann Schein.

Qing Zhao was born in China and has won prizes in numerous competitions, including First Prize in the "Xinghai Cup" National Teenager Piano Contest, Children Group in 2006; Outstanding Prize in the Steinway International Teenager Piano Contest, China contest zone 2007; Second Prize in the Wiesbaden International Teenager Piano Contest, Beijing contest zone, 2009; and the Excellence Prize in the "Cadenza Cup" China Piano Works National Piano Contest, Professional Group, 2009. From 2005 to 2015, Zhao studied under Professor Wu Yuan at the Central Conservatory in China and is currently pursuing a Bachelor's degree at the Eastman School of Music under Professor Barry Snyder.
