Course Description

This course introduces the legal foundations of healthcare in America. The material covers a broad range of legal issues in medical care, including constitutional issues related to federalism, an introduction to legal thinking, and judicial review. The course also provides an overview of specific legal issues in the health law and policymaking universe, which may include COVID, immunizations, health care reform including the Affordable Care Act ("Obamacare"), the Americans with Disabilities Act, abortion, the doctrine of informed consent, surrogate decision making in health care, and end-of-life advance directives. The course introduces problem-solving

skills in healthcare and law and explores the various legal solutions reached by legislatures and the courts.

The course is divided into modules.

Module 1: This first part of this course covers identification of personal values, the role of individuals, community and government, healthcare law issues in the news, and definitions of health and law.

Module 2 addresses legal foundations, such as fundamental legal concepts and how they relate to healthcare. You will obtain the skills necessary to find, read, understand, and analyze primary legal documents (legislation and legal opinions). The content will include the structure of government, the foundations of health law, and an introduction to legal thinking.

Module 3 covers key aspects of health care financing and legal reform efforts; topics may include an overview of the U.S. health care system, and the Affordable Care Act.

Module 4 will cover health equity and discrimination and other access barriers to health care, such as discrimination on the basis of religion, disability, and sex (including access to contraception and abortion).

Module 5 will cover ethics and the law, which will cover the right to life, the right to die, and surrogate decision-making.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Apply key concepts related to personal values, spot health law issues in the news, and define dimensions of "health" and "law"
- 2. Describe the role of governments and law in promoting and protecting health, including the functions of courts, legislatures, and administrative agencies in relation to health care law and policy
- 3. Apply legal skills including finding, closely reading, and analyzing judicial opinions (cases) and statutes (legislation)
- 4. Identify the legal underpinnings of the healthcare system
- 5. Identify equity and discriminatory aspects addressed by healthcare law.

Course Assignments

Academic Honesty Affirmance (1 point)

You are required to read and affirm the University's policy on academic honesty (1 point) Attendance & Participation (5 points)

News Presentation (5 points)

The last 3 classes, students will research the news as a group exercise, and prepare a class presentation addressing the nature of the problem, the laws involved, and predict the outcome of the legal debate.

In-class Open-case Brief Questionnaires (3 15-point assignments – lowest grade will get dropped – 30 points total)

During three unannounced class sessions, each student will write and turn in case brief questionnaires; i.e. answers to questions about the assigned case. These in-class assignments are open case and worth 15% each. Students may drop one assignment during the semester to allow for unanticipated absences. Your total grade for the in-class assignments will be the sum of the top 2 out of the 3 grades.

Case brief questionnaires 4 assignments (50 points total)

Reading legal documents is a skill that requires practice. The 4 case brief questionnaires will provide you with questions to facilitate a close reading and understanding of the different components of primary material, and I expect to see gradual improvement over the course of the semester in your analysis.

Advance Directive/Living will (5 points)

Health care and the law intersect markedly at the end of life. Students will be asked to read the New York State advance directives law, and using a guided form, reflect on their own values and fill out legally valid advance directives [note: these become legally effective only if witnessed and signed by others].
