## Identity, Ethnicity and Nationalism

**Professor Meguid**

#### **Course Description**

This course explores the concepts of identity, ethnicity and nationalism from a comparative perspective. Drawing upon theories from political science, anthropology, sociology and economics, we will examine how identity is defined and how societies use these constructions for, among other things, nation-building, war, and party competition. Theoretical readings will be supplemented with empirical studies from developed and developing countries across different time periods.

#### **Course Requirements**

Students are expected to attend lectures every Monday and Wednesday and keep up with the readings. Lectures will be interspersed with discussions of the readings.

<u>Participation:</u> Regular, active and informed participation is expected; participation is worth 10% of the grade. It is based on showing up for class, answering questions during discussion of the lectures and readings, and correctly completing brief pop quizzes. Pop quizzes will be distributed (randomly chosen and unannounced) in a handful of lectures. They will be easy and are designed to make sure that you are doing the reading. If you are not present at lecture, you cannot get credit for the quiz unless you notified me (in advance of the lecture) that you cannot attend that lecture for some legitimate reason (e.g., illness; severe injuries or other medical conditions; religious or cultural holidays; athletic or debate competitions; or weddings, funerals, or other major life-cycle events). I will not penalize your participation grade for occasional absences for these legitimate reasons listed above.

<u>Midterm and Final:</u> There is an in-class midterm exam (worth 35% of the grade) and a cumulative final exam (worth 55% of the grade) during final exam period. The final is currently set for May 6 starting at 4 pm per the Registrar. Because the timing could change, <u>DO NOT</u> arrange to leave for break before the end of the exam period. Barring extraordinary circumstances, there will be <u>no make-up midterm or final exams</u>.
